In October 2018, a group of ten non-governmental organizations (including ADRA Albania) launched a new 2-year project called Humanitarian Volunteers in Action (HVA) in French town Roubaix. The HVA project aims to send volunteers to certified organizations in particular regions of the Global South. HVA has been implemented thanks to the financial support from the biggest European donor - the European Union - the initiator of the EU Aid Volunteers program.

This autumn 2019, we welcomed our two first volunteers, one from Italy and the other from Germany. They are assisting the office by developing its institutional goals, objectives and provide expertise in project management.

Besides that, ADRA Albania is benefitting from the skills of other volunteers coming from ADRA Slovakia and ADRA Germany. Veronika, from Slovakia, has been part of our staff for the past two years thanks to a program financially supported by Slovak Aid. She assisted competently with the projects and the office for the past two years. Anna and Rebekka, two dynamic girls from Germany, are part of our staff since this summer 2019 through ADRA live program which offers young people the opportunity to get involved socially abroad.

In 2018, ADRA Albania has inaugurated the first Seven-Days-Adventist kindergarten in Albania. In this respect an international volunteer is serving there.

Return to Thrive





Return to Thrive

Albania is a country with one of the highest rates of migration worldwide. In recent years the desire to emigrate rose up to 56% among its adult population.

A considerable number of emigrants are people from minority and vulnerable groups, who flee the country seeking for protection and better life in western European states. However, from 2015, Albania is categorized as a "safe country of origin" and the instrument of asylum is no longer widely applicable. The "Return to Thrive" project aims to enhance the engagement of public institutions in migration management on one hand, and to support returnees in accessing public services, education and/or labor market on the other. Following this objective career counselling for adults, literacy and numeracy classes are provided to returnee children and adults.



"I have moved several times in Italy and Kosovo. In Italy, I stayed for almost one year. I used to work in the service sector, "black work" but at least I could gain some money to afford the living [...]. Then I also moved to Kosovo where I used to beg to ensure any income to my family. I returned back to my country in 2018. When I returned, I faced many difficulties, I was unemployed, with no support or possibility to afford the living. I have been seeking a job since I came here, but I could not find any good alternative. There are not too many options for me since I have no education and specific professional ability.

ADRA Albania contacted me some months ago and I am continuously in touch with them by being advised and consulted to fulfil my needs. Thanks to ADRA support first I got a job as a driver in a recycling factory but for health issues, I stayed a few weeks there and now I got a position as a driver in a private company. I am feeling good now. At least I ensure some income to my family! [...] Thanks to the support given to me, I think things are getting better now."

for the education of Roma

and Egyptian children

March 2019 - December 2019

The Roma and Egyptians are among the marginalized communities in Albania.

In Fushë-Krujë, Roma live in a ghetto just outside of the city in really severe conditions. Two to twelve family members live in a house of two rooms, with access to water and electricity from unsafe and unverified sources. Collection of plastic and scrap material is the major source of income. During the assessment of the education level of children in their communities, ADRA found out that a considerably high number of children do not attend school regularly or do not attend at all. The main reasons for the low school attendance are lack of parental support, supplies and discrimination by peers. Parents justify it with difficult economic situations, unemployment and the fact that they themselves do not like school. While schoolteachers' opinion on the difficulty of working with Roma and Egyptian children is divided, they all agree that the language barrier, the fact that they come to lessons unprepared and irregular attendance are the main cause of school-drop out. When questioned, parents expressed little interest in their child's school activities. The majority of the children get ready and walk to school alone. They are given money to buy lunch, which often ends up at a candy shop or local fast food.

The project was designed to build literacy, numeracy and social capacities not only of the children, but also of parents and other family members, thus, to create a positive family environment for the education and personal growth of children.

Children Empowerment*

The public education system in Albania, despite efforts, severe challenges. Due to inefficient infrastructure in overcrowded schools, the staff lacks the facilities and capacities to address children's needs in adequate manner.

The project directly supports children with learning differences or at risk of dropping-out, from the 1st to 5th grade in 2 public schools in Tirana and 1 school in Thumanë, Kruja region. ADRA's goal isn't only to give access to their right to education, but also to contribute to a more educated and inclusive society. With the implementation of the project, we aim to provide positive practices that foster creative child-centered teaching. We have provided educational services, with a particular interest in school effectiveness. Our task consists of improving the school through professional training of the teachers, by enhancing the quality of teaching and developing positive practices in dealing with cases of children with learning difficulties.

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


Humanitarian Assistance to

Earthquake-Affected Communities in

Kruja Municipality

At the end of November 2019, Albania was hit by a 6,4magnitude earthquake followed by several powerful aftershocks, costing the lives of dozens and injuring thousands. The epicenter was in the Adriatic Sea close to Durrës and 30 km west of the capital, Tirana. It was the strongest earthquake to hit Albania since 1979 and the world's deadliest earthquake in 2019. It is estimated that 80,000 - 100,000 people are directly affected by the earthquake. There is significant damage to infrastructure, including residential areas schools and medical centers. An unidentified number of people are suffering from posttraumatic stress disorder and are in urgent need of psychosocial support.

The intervention is focused on some of the most affected which geographical areas are: Krujë, administrative units of Fushë-Krujë, Bubg and Tirana. In spite of political rhetoric, providing the Roma and Egyptian communities with humanitarian aid is not considered a priority of the government and state institutions. ADRA Albania has been implementing educational projects int the affected regions for over ten years, including psychosocial support to vulnerable groups of adults and children. Due to this long-term presence and involvement at grassrootslevel, ADRA Albania is well known by the communities as













well as the local authorities. For this reason, the intervention specifically targets the needs of Roma and Egyptians, communities which are nor even further marginalized, while also taking into consideration additional vulnerable groups.

In total, 585 people (over 100 families) are directly benefiting from the project's activities. These comprise, among others, hot meals, stoves, portable toilets, showers, solar water heaters, washing machines, hygiene kits, tents and other shelter materials. Additionally, approximately 3,500 children and adults are provided with psychosocial support through individual counselling sessions, group therapy sessions excursions and supplementary classes.

Funded by several donors of the ADRA Network, the project is implemented and coordinated by ADRA Albania. It will run until May 31st, 2020.



"I was very scared to go home because one of the main columns of the building was damaged and about to fall. We have been waiting for the municipal staff to come and give us tents to stay in, but no one showed up".



"ADRA came early in the morning and stayed with us, asked us how we experienced the earthquake, asked what our needs were and tried to stay with the kids and play with them. ADRA provided us with food from the very first day after the earthquake and they still are serving us hot meals. The food is very good. It makes me very happy seeing not only my son but all the kids in the neighborhood being happy while eating at the community center."

ADRA Albania in cooperation with ADRA Germany and ADRA Austria has been delivering Christmas parcels to the ones in need for 17 years now.

Loving wishes and donations from children in Germany and Austria, brought the magic of Christmas to children in areas most affected by the disastrous earthquake of November 2019.

The packages from Brandenburg and Saxony (parts of Germany) arrived on the 9th of December 2019 in Albania with 2.815 parcels and 501 Banana Boxes. In the banana boxes from the Children helping Children project are bed sheets, duvet covers, towels, pillows and a lot more of these things.

Since 1999, ADRA has been transporting tens of thousands of gift packages to Eastern European countries every year during the Christmas campaign, thus creating a glimmer of hope in the lives of children.

These Christmas parcels are packed by children from Central and Northern Europe. They fill the parcels with school supplies, toys, cuddly toys and other useful things that are small things but are something special for the children in need. This action does something for both sides: children from industrialized countries learn that not everyone in the world is as well off as they are and that they can do something good for them with little effort. The children and adolescents who receive these packages usually receive a Christmas present for the first time in their lives and their reactions show our helpers every year how much this small gesture means to them."



In September 2018, ADRA Albania in cooperation with the Adventist Church inaugurated the first Adventist kindergarten in Albania. Tirana Adventist Kindergarten is part of the worldwide Adventist Education system and it has been built to provide a wonderful environment where children can play safely.

Recently, ADRA Albania has focused on educating children because it believes that investing in early education will create happy children and happy families, thus contributing to a better society. Everything was possible through generous donations from the Adventist Church in Sydney and donations from Croatia, Trans European Division and the Albanian Mission ADRA Albania.

A group of volunteers from Australia came to rebuild the venue and remodel the environment of kindergarten project.

There are three different groups: 3-4 years, 4-5 years and 5-6 years. Besides Music, Art and Cooking lessons, every morning they have Story time in English. The kids go outside in the big garden and play in the playground or learn creatively in the greenhouse. Every day they get fresh food. "My greatest pleasure is to cook for the kids and to receive their sincere thanks after every meal." – Aida Lala (chef)
